- Be a changemaker and contribute to important conversations.




FINDING SPEAKING OPPORTUNITIES



You can find speaking opportunities by:

- Asking your manager, team lead, mentor, etc. if there are opportunities for you to speak, teach or mentor.
- Googling key phrases like "Call for Proposal Tech Conferences or Events" / "Apply to Speak Tech Conference."
- Joining a WWCode Network and volunteering to speak.
- Responding to WWCode Call for Proposals for Major Events.





COMING UP WITH A TALK PROPOSAL IDEA: CONSIDERATIONS



First...overcome imposter syndrome!

- It is a myth that you have to be an industry expert or experienced speaker to present at a conference.
- You have knowledge, opinions, and experiences that could benefit your community and other technologists.
- Many technologists have made their speaking debut at WWCode events, including our Global conferences with thousands of attendees!



Understand what is a talk proposal.

- A talk proposal is your opportunity to offer to share your expertise or experience at an event/conference.
- Your talk proposal will include a talk title and description, as well as any other information the application requests (e.g., headshot, bio, more details about your proposal).
- You will likely encounter "CFP." CFP stands for "Call for Proposals", which is our call for your talk proposals.



Consider "talks" you have already given that you could base your proposal on.

- Have you given a talk, workshop or training session at work or school?
- Have you taught a colleague, friend, or mentee something technical or career related?
- Have you published a blog or article (either formally or informally – e.g., on LinkedIn) on a technical or career topic?





Consider experiences unique to you that you could base your proposal on.

- Have you completed training or learning you would like to now pass on to others?
- Have you accomplished something personal that has supported your career in tech that could be a good example or inspiration for others?
- Have you accomplished something professional (e.g., landed your dream job, deployed your first app, developed a new tool) and you could share the "how" with others?
- Do you have an interesting perspective or opinion on current industry trends?



Consider what you want to achieve by giving your talk.

- Explain a concept relevant to the audience they could benefit from knowing either personally or professionally.
- Show or demonstrate a new technology or technique through live examples.
- Give the audience an opportunity to try hands-on or learn by doing something.
- Inspire the audience to think differently.
- Challenge the audience to question the status quo through your diverse opinion.
- Engage the audience in discussion / connect them.



Consider the audience for your talk.

- What level of learner is your talk for?
- What demographics will make up your audience?
- What subjects interest this audience most?
- What don't they know that you can teach them?
- Why do they need to know this now?
 How will it benefit them?





Consider your talk format.

- Explain a concept relevant to the audience they could benefit from knowing either personally or professionally – lighting talk!
- Show or demonstrate a new technology or technique through live examples long/full talk!
- Give the audience an opportunity to try or learn by doing something workshop!
- Inspire or challenge the audience to think differently keynote or panel!
- Engage the audience in discussion / connect them panel or networking session!



Consider the conference CFP.

Pay attention to all guidelines and follow instructions fully, including:

- **Topic requests** don't waste time submitting an irrelevant topic to the event.
- Audience don't waste time submitting a topic that doesn't fit the audience.
- Proposal lengths and requirements.
 - Tip: Be sure your proposal is interesting, accurate and free of errors.
- Speaker bio and headshot.
 - Tip: Be sure your bio is concise (highlighting achievements why you are an expert in this area), name is as you would like it to appear and your headshot is professional/high quality.



Things to avoid:

- Repetitive ideas / talk proposals what's something new you are bringing to this audience?
- Borrowed content your idea / proposal should be unique to you!
- Short / underdeveloped descriptions that don't:
 - Explain what your talk will be about.
 - Explain what the audience will learn.
- Poorly written descriptions:
 - Full of errors.
 - Not edited / too long.
 - Not developed / too short.
- Submitting without a peer review to help ensure your talk is interesting, accurate, and free of errors.

WRITING A TALK PROPOSAL TITLE



So now that you've decided...

- You have something to say...
- What you would like to accomplish with your talk...
- Who is the audience for your talk...
- What is the best format for your talk...
- Your talk is a good fit for a conference/event...
- You can follow the submission guidelines...

...it's time to write a talk title!



First impressions matter!

Your talk title is the **first thing** a CFP reviewer will evaluate when considering whether to accept your talk. It is also the first thing an attendee will evaluate when considering whether to attend your talk, if selected, so it is very important.

The goal of your talk title is to use exciting language to share what your talk is about using only a few words.



Your Talk Title Should:

- Be 5-10 words in length.
- Clearly describe what your talk will discuss or teach and not simply state the topic plainly.
 - Make sure to include keywords and language that help a reader to understand your talk and what sets it apart from other talks. A reviewer wants to understand your unique approach to your topic.
- Be accurate and free of errors.
- Bonus points: Be fun, playful, or clever.



Example successful talk titles:

- Let's Get Fired Up: Getting Started with Firebase Firestore
- The Making of a Mentor: Elevate Your Connections & Career by Helping Others
- Secure but Accessible: Building Sites Your Users Can Actually Use
- 13 Tips to Write Code Like a Swiftie
- How to Get Out of Tutorial Hell and Start Building Something



Tip: Start with a verb!

One option for your talk title is to start with a verb.

- Improving Communication for the Introverted Engineer
- Mitigating Biased Algorithms in the Real World
- Developing Emotionally Intelligent Teams in Tech



Tip: Tell it in two parts!

In two-part talk titles, the first part might strongly share what the talk is about and could stand-alone, while the second part explains more — goes more in-depth — about what the talk will cover.

- Building More Inclusive Android Apps: Animation & Reduced Movement
- Type-Setting in CSS: Using Typography to Enhance Your Design
- Building Your Career Like a Product: A Project Manager's Take



Tip: Make it fun!

You can write a creative talk title, perhaps with a fun play on words — but be careful of "click bait." Don't write an "empty" title that still doesn't explain what the talk is about or what the reader will learn.

- A CraSSH Course in SSH
- Digging Ourselves Out of Code Debt



Tip: Make it actionable!

You can highlight tips and tricks, do's and don'ts, and mistakes and pitfalls to avoid — takeaways your reader can learn and start implementing right away.

- What They Don't Tell You About Tech Interviews
- Do's and Don'ts of Professional Networking
- Mistakes to Avoid as an Al Practitioner in Industry

WRITING YOUR TALK PROPOSAL DESCRIPTION



Make good on your title!

Your talk description is the **second thing** a CFP reviewer will evaluate when considering whether to accept your talk. It is also the second thing an attendee will evaluate when considering whether to attend your talk.

You will write a few sentences to describe what your talk will cover, who it is for, why they should come, and what they will learn.



Your talk description should:

- Be 50-100 words (but follow the CFP requirements)
- Answer "so what?" or "why should someone learn/know this?"
 - What problem or issue is your talk addressing?
- Clearly but concisely describe:
 - What your talk will cover.
 - What the audience will know or be able to do after coming to your talk that they could not do or did not know before.
- Be accurate and free of errors.



Description checklist:

- Does my talk description clearly match my talk title?
- Does the audience know what problem or issue I'm helping them solve?
- Did I cover the key topics I will discuss in my talk?
- Do I gesture toward the learning level or audience for the talk?
- Does the audience know what they will learn or be able to do after coming to my talk?
- Does my talk follow formatting guidelines and is free of errors?



Example successful talk description:

Is a Dev Bootcamp Right for Me?

© 15 Minute Career Lightning Talk, Main Stage

Dev bootcamps have become popular in recent years as a faster, more affordable path into tech — but how do you know if one is right for you? Join Chris Belanger, Head of Community at Kodeco, a global online mobile dev learning platform that runs iOS and Android bootcamps. Discover the benefits of participating in a bootcamp, what really happens during a dev bootcamp; and what your career options are after completing a bootcamp.

Example successful talk description:

Building More Inclusive Android Apps: Animation and Reduced Movement

35 Minute Technical Talk, Mobile Stage

Not all users enjoy animations. Different types of movement and animations can be distracting or cause symptoms such as nausea or dizziness. Many users survive in our animated digital world by modifying the operating system level setting to reduce animations. Join this session for a discussion on creating inclusive native Android apps to gain an understanding of potential problems that animations might cause for some users. Learn how to develop more inclusively and respect the animation setting in native Android apps.
